Cleaning guidelines

Below are the guidelines for cleaning taken from the Churches Conservation Trust. Please don't use any cleaning products with bleach on any surface.

Timber

Pews, floorboards, pulpit, lectern, piano, organ, doors, altar rail

- Dust timbers with a lint free cloth or brush. In certain situations, a combination of a brush, vacuum, and cloth will be needed for complex or intricate shapes.
- Unless otherwise instructed please only use dry, or very slightly damp cloths to clean
- Spray polishes contain silicon and should not be used. They can cause damage to surfaces.
- Use wax polish sparingly, infrequently, and only when needed to ensure layers of wax are not built up.
- If you notice any signs of insect damage, beetle infestation or rot please let one of the trustees know.
- A soft brush can mobilise dirt from carved details such as pew ends

Floors

- Sweep floorboards with a soft broom or vacuum
- Do not apply wax polish to any areas that have rugs or other items placed on top as this causes a slip hazard
- Try to avoid mopping, but the hall tiles may need it. If it is essential use an almost dry mop or cloth as is slow to dry and stays damp.
- Alter Tiles: These are original Cistercian, loose and very fragile. These should be either dusted with a cloth or very gently swept to remove dust.
- **Plaster:** please be careful when sweeping up plaster. It is recommended that a mask should be worn.

Textiles

Carpets, rugs

- The alter cloth is regularly replaced by Carol, this just needs clearing of any fallen flowers.
- Shake, sweep or vacuum mats and carpets.
- If you discover mould, please let one of the trustees know.

Stone

Font, exhibits

- Work from top to bottom and use a soft cloth or brush to dust into a dustpan or vacuum nozzle.
- Window Sills brush or dust

Glass

Cabinets, display boards.
